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### Team Mobility meets in Krakow, Poland

The Mobility project, which is coordinated by LINET and seeks ways to introduce innovation to the professional education of nurses, is coming to a close. In the middle of February, the second-to-last meeting of the international team working on the project was held in the Polish city of Krakow. Among other things, participants learned about the methods used for the practical teaching of nursing skills at Jagiellonian University and they also visited the ICU at Krakow University Hospital, which is equipped with the latest medical technologies.



*"The visit to Krakow produced a range of ideas on how to increase support for innovative approaches to the long-term education of nurses, not only for the Czech Republic, but also in the other countries that are participating in the project. We trust that we will succeed in putting together an equally inspiring meeting in May in the Czech Republic, where the Mobility project will be brought to a close,"* says LINET Marketing Manager and coordinator of the project Pavlína Horová.

During the recent meeting, a great deal of attention was also paid to the unique concept known as Fairy Tale Hospital, which was presented in Krakow by guests from Hungary. The concept focuses primarily on children's hospitals and covers medical care, prevention, psychological consultation,

medical education of patient family members, and the sharing of professional know-how among nurses.

The agenda in Poland also included a visit to a museum in Krakow devoted to nursing care and nurses.

Mobility is a joint project of professional nursing organizations in Czech Republic and Poland, the Swedish Karolinska University Hospital, and LINET's subsidiaries in France and Sweden. By July of 2014, Mobility will present a list of recommendations for the improvement of lifelong learning in medical professions, thus contributing to the creation of an international partner network to collaborate on implementing the recommendations. The project has been made possible through a grant from the European Leonardo da Vinci Programme, which is focused on supporting vocational education.
